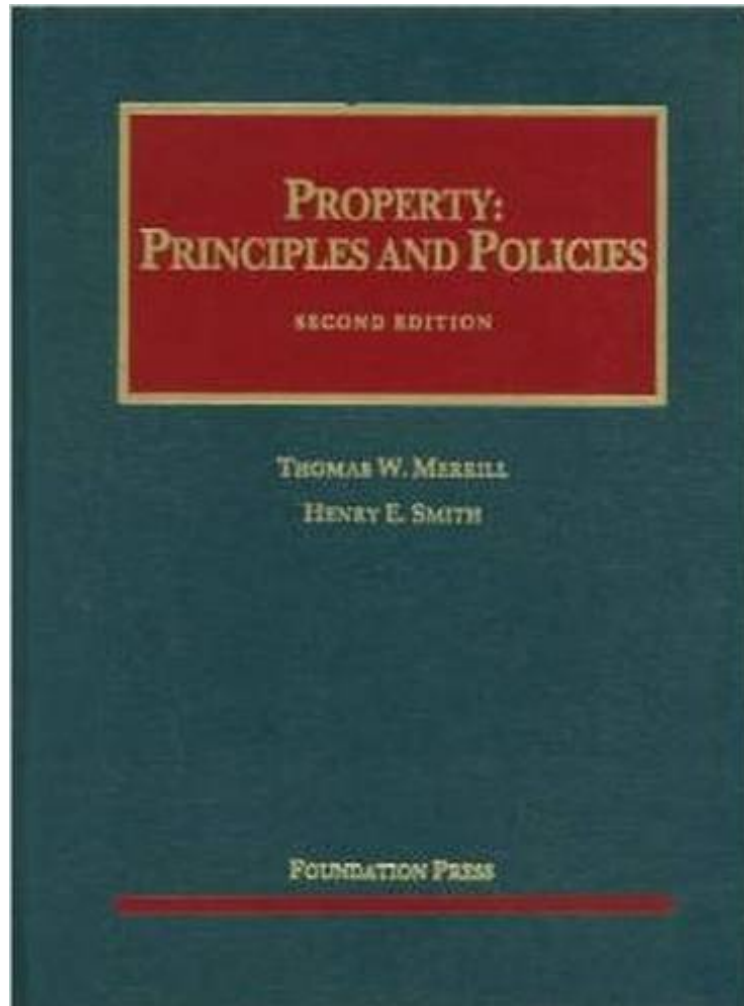

Literally the worst casebook I have ever readBy CustomerThis casebook is heavily developed around theory, theory, and more theory, and a significant percentage of the introductory cases have little to no relevance in the modern era. Yes, I get that some professors like to teach in that context, but it really is not helpful in regards to exam preparation. Exams are built around black letter law, not theory and cases from the 18th and 19th centuries, and this casebook does a horrendous job of establishing any reasonable framework for analysis. Buy the book to keep up with class, I guess, but please pick up a hornbook if you actually want to learn the law.

This revised casebook is designed for a building block property course that serves as a students foundation for the rest of law school and beyond. Avoiding the typical hodge-podge of issues, the book presents material in an integrated way, starting with the central role of exclusive in rem rights in property, and systematically developing elaborations, exceptions, and counterfoils to this idea using vivid cases, both old and new. Timely issues in intellectual property, mortgages, and regulatory takings, as well as traditional topics like equity and restitution, are given expansive treatment. The emphasis throughout is on fundamental principles and policy questions.
